Course Description

The goal of this course is for students to master the foundational logic, theory, and history of work in psychology. After completing this course, students should be prepared to successfully sit the AP Psychology exam.

Course Objectives

The objectives of this course are for students to: (a) broaden their knowledge of the field of psychology; (b) understand and apply various psychological concepts and principles; (c) identify the relevance of psychology to everyday life; (d) gain insight into research in psychology; and (e) develop critical thinking skills.

Course Structure, Requirements and Grading

Lectures. Lectures will be held Monday through Thursday. There will be occasional quizzes at the beginning of lecture to help students assess their understanding and become familiar with the type of questions that will appear on the exam. Lecture attendance and class participation is worth 25% of your grade. Participation can be made by engaging in class discussion or by emailing the instructor a question following lecture.

Exams. There will be 3, cumulative, in-class, closed-book exams during the term. The exams will include material that is covered in class lectures, and from the assigned reading. Exams will consist of multiple choice questions similar to the AP Psychology exam. Each exam will take a full 2 hour class period. Each exam is worth 25% of your grade (75% total).

Information about the final exam schedule from the Provost rules: "No student may be required to take more than two final examinations on any calendar day during the period in which final examinations are scheduled. If more than two are scheduled, the student may postpone the middle exam. If a take-home final exam is due on a day when two final examinations are scheduled, the take-home exam shall be postponed by one day."
